Explore by Bike

Rental Centre

We have bicycles, paddle boards, canoes, kayaks, pedal boats, and rowboats to rent out. Just show up at our rental centre at the far end of the picnic area and choose one of several options to explore the park and Reservoir Choinière. Rental is always free for those 17 and under in a family setting.

Motion Park

Test your agility and strength! The Motion Park gives you an outdoor Ninja Warrior experience with a side-by-side race. The structures will include a set of balance exercises (Ninja Steps), a structure with various hanging obstacles, a slanted (warped) wall and Airbag jumping!

Come enjoy the pedestrian paths, fatbikes (VPS), snowshoeing, sliding, wildlife observation, ice fishing and cross-country skiing with our new surface grooming technique. There are stunning viewpoints to take in. Head to the Visitors Centre for equipment rental from December through March.

Your park Celebrates its 40th Anniversary

In 1983, this territory was officially designated Yamaska Provincial Park with a primary recreational purpose. In 1999, the provincial government gave Sépaq the mandate to administer the territory, which would become Yamaska National Park in 2001.



*******	La Rivière – This trail provides a varied panorama. You will be engulfed by a dense pine forest and its intriguing environment. You will come upon north Yamaska river as it exits from the forest at the foot of the Choinière dam. This trail is enhanced by a game of questions and observations about nature for	2.5 Km loop	1 h	E		
外 京南	La Forestière – At a stone's throw from the beach service area, La Forestière trail is home to a variety of wildlife and provides a great overview of the tree mosaic of the park. By walking through it, you will come across young hardwood forests, dense patches of evergreens and then sense the greatness of the forest canopy of mature maple stands.	5.5 Km loop	2 h	E		
*	La Digue – Sugar maples of which the huge trunks majestically flank the trail are a reminder of this species' dominant rank in the forest mosaic of the park. From the promontory formed by the stone wall of the 560 metres long Choinière levee, you will have the perfect spot to spy on the habits of the species that utilize Réservoir Choinière shoreline and forest edge to feed and to rest.	5.8 Km loop	2 h	E	Visitors Centre	
K	La Pinède - Compact and dense massifs of fir trees, dominated by white pine, with undulating hills of fallow fields, passing by mature maple forests, you will be able to witness the various forest evolutionary stages along very short distances. Pay special attention to details such as the discreet presence of a few former orchards which are vestiges of a not-so-distant era.	10.3 Km loop	3 h 30	E	>	
*	Le Grand-Tour – By bicycle or on foot, there is no better way to get a good overview of the park than to criss-cross it along the multifunctional path called Le Grand-Tour. This journey will take you along Réservoir Choinère's shoreline, where you will disappear into the enticing forest and then emerge to climb the hillsides of fallow fields. While discovering this path, you will also learn about the history of the reservoir.	19 Km loop	5 h 30	E

Learn How to Fish

This is a fun and safe way for young fishing apprentices to become acquainted with the world of fishing. Our supervised activity lasts 2 hours and introduces you to the fish species, their habitat and the basics of fishing while respecting the environment, wildlife and the fishing regulations in Québec. We provide the fishing gear and our park ranger-naturalist and naturalist accompanies you.

A Tale of Racoons

Gather around the campfire for storytime! A park ranger-naturalist will go to your campsite and regale you with stories around the campfire. The activity lasts from 15 to 20 minutes and highlights the antics of the park's raccoons. Reality or made-up stories? You be the judge!

Cost: \$5 + taxes per family.



Navigating the Past

As early as the 19th century, many families occupied the parcels of land that make up what today is the Yamaska National Park. The families Maxime, Delorme, Choinière, and others have lived on this land for generations. Let us tell you about this unusual chapter in the human history of the sector. A boat trip of approximately 120 minutes takes you back in time, from one buoy to the next. Locate the starting buoys in front of the beach area and explore the history of this territory.

CONSERVE FOR TOMORROW

Are you a **Responsible Fisher?**

Yellow perch is on the decline in the park! Find out about proper catch-and-release techniques. Good practices to follow are rinsing your hands in water before handling fish, not touching their gills and eyes, limiting handling time out of the water, and keeping the fish horizontal. Use artificial baits and lures or circle hooks with natural baits to reduce the risk of serious injury to the fish.

Alder Buckthorn

Alder buckthorn is an invasive plant that gives many a headache to the owners of wooded lots in the Eastern Townships! It aggressively competes for space with local species. In the park, it is currently found only in the southwest sector, and we organize weeding activities to eliminate it and to keep its expansion in check.

5 GOOD PRACTICES TO ADOPT IN NATURE



Stay on trails and in designated visitor areas

Taking shortcuts can destroy vegetation.



Do not gather dead wood*

To preserve the natural environment, it is prohibited to remove natural elements, including animals, plants, dead wood, and rocks.



Do not feed wildlife*

Feeding wildlife negatively impacts their natural feeding habits. Keep all food out of reach of animals.



Keep your distance when observing wildlife

When animals are repeatedly disturbed, their natural behaviors can change, and they can develop problems to feed, find a mate, and communicate among themselves.



Respect the peace and tranquility, and comply with curfews

People come to national parks to relax and enjoy nature. Please respect curfews and avoid playing music at all times.


*Failure to comply with rules governing parks and authorized activities is considered a violation of the Parks Act and Parks Regulation.
