
Visit the "nest": The Perras Tower

Whether walking or cycling, your visit to the Perras tower will amaze you! This nest-shaped observation tower is a tribute to the tremendous diversity of the birds that live and reproduce within the park, such as in the Perras marsh. You will be treated to spectacular views of the marsh and the Ottawa River. Bring your binoculars! Starting point: Maison Galipeau, Thurso sector.

Bike the Des Outaouais Trail


Cyclists will fall in love with the Outaouais bike trail. This 21-kilometre round trip follows the Ottawa River and crosses numerous habitats. including marshes, bays and a majestic stand of silver maple. Have a snack at the baie Dubé picnic area before starting back.

La Zizanie-des-Marais: Walk on water!

national de Plaisance. One kilometre of pathway - including over 400 metres of floating pathway - takes you right to the heart of our marshes teeming with life! You will most certainly spot beaver or muskrat dens along the way if not a great blue heron or red-winged blackbird! The flowering aquatic plants found here in the summer are also a gorgeous spectacle not to be missed.







Le Marais-aux-Rubaniers

Are you yearning for a complete change of scene? That's what this trail, which features over 500 metres of raised walkway on stilts - offers you as it crosses a lush forest. Located in a section of the park that floods every spring and is normally inaccessible, this raised walkway also takes you to the heart of the splendid Rubaniers marsh. Come discover a marvellous spot for bird watching!

Paddle to the Chutes Du Moulin Falls

With a vertical drop of nearly 60 metres (higher than Niagara Falls), these falls, also called the Plaisance Falls, are definitely worth a visit. Fear not, however. The idea is not to go down them but rather to paddle along the Petite Nation river to view them from below. This beginner level, 10-kilometre trip takes approximately 3.5 hours and can be done by canoe, kayak or paddleboard. The team's friendly suggestion: bring a snack! From the base of the falls, a small path leads to a lookout offering breathtaking views.



DISCOVERY TIME





Parc national de Plaisance is undoubtedly one of the best places for birdwatching in Québec. The proof is that over 100 species of birds can be seen or heard any given day during migration season. Some of these species nest in the park while other, more rare species such as the American White Pelican are just passing through. You're welcome

Did you know that you can see art inside the park? Nature has inspired a number of artists to create artwork on site. Here are two places where culture and nature come together.

Dollard-des-Ormeaux picnic area

Located at the entrance to the Presqu'îles sector, this site features an exhibition of life-size works by seven professional artists who found inspiration in the Ottawa River and our amazing landscape to create art. Thanks to these works, you can do a "mini-artistic pilgrimage" into the heart of a truly enchanting setting.

La Carrière picnic area

A 60-metre long Canada goose was created by a local artist, Guy-Louis Poncelet. Built from rock from an old quarry, this odd bird can be seen from the Carrière picnic area. Getting there involves a beautiful six-kilometre bike ride from the Discovery and Visitors Centre or a 500-metre ride from the Baie-Noire parking lot (Thurso sector).





A refreshing break?

A break at the pool or the splash pad is often very welcome after a hike. And, only a few steps from these facilities, the store at the Carapace Services Centre offers a variety of ice cream treats – which make for a doubly refreshing break!

Relax at the Desjardins picnic area, an ideal spot to eat outside, read under the trees or play in the sand! Note that there is no lifeguard on duty, so swimming is at your own risk and the water quality is not checked.

Paddle from bay to bay

Whether you're in a canoe, rowboat, or kayak or on a paddleboard, you can choose from a number of destinations. The Petite-Nation canal, an artificial waterway dating from the late 40s, allows you to reach the magnificent marshes in Pentecôte bay (allow one hour to half a day). Also take advantage of the new rental centre at the Carapace Services Centre to rent a canoe or paddleboard (quantities limited). From there, you can reach Parisien bay, a body of water perfect for beginners.

The fight against exotic invasive plants

While walking on the Outaouais trail, have you noticed the large black tarps placed near the water? This is one of the techniques used to eradicate plants threatening the ecological integrity of our ecosystems.

The park's team will continue fighting these invaders by installing additional tarps in coming years. Have no fear, they aren't permanent. Although they're not especially attractive, when used in combination with revegetation techniques, they can eliminate the invaders and re-establish great biodiversity.

Nearly 1000 animals have died on our roads over the past 10 years

Our park wardens have been keeping statistics on the animals found dead on the park's roads since 2013. They came to a grand total of nearly 1,000 individuals of all species. At the top of this unfortunate list was the common garter snake, with 245 individuals. The victims also included many turtles, squirrels, beavers, mink and other small animals.

The park's team is continually striving to prevent accidents involving fauna. However, success depends first and foremost on driver vigilance. The team has installed roadside signage in the most accident-prone areas to remind people.

Our national parks

Given the millions of visits to our national parks annually, harmful behaviors can cause permanent damage to the environment and negatively impact the experience of other visitors. Let's do our part to care for these extraordinary nature sites so we can all enjoy them for years to come.

5 GOOD PRACTICES TO ADOPT IN NATURE



Stay on trails and in designated visitor areas

Taking shortcuts can destroy vegetation.



Do not gather dead wood*

To preserve the natural environment, it is prohibited to remove natural elements, including animals, plants, dead wood, and rocks.



Do not feed wildlife*

Feeding wildlife negatively impacts their natural feeding habits. Keep all food out of reach of animals.



Keep your distance when observing wildlife

When animals are repeatedly disturbed, their natural behaviors can change, and they can develop problems to feed, find a mate, and communicate among themselves.



Respect the peace and tranquility, and comply with curfews

People come to national parks to relax and enjoy nature. Please respect curfews and avoid playing music at all times.

*Failure to comply with rules governing parks and authorized activities is considered a violation of the Parks Act and Parks Regulation.
